

Foreword

The Annual Agricultural Review is a publication of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries, Physical Planning, Natural Resources and Cooperatives prepared by the Corporate Planning Unit. It provides current and historical statistical data, analyses and information on the agricultural sector in Saint Lucia. It is expected that the various stakeholders within the agriculture sector, learning institutions, partner agencies and the general community will find this publication informative and relevant for their decision making and development planning.

The staff of the Corporate Planning Unit in particular and the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries Physical Planning, Natural Resources and Cooperatives would like to take this opportunity to thank all those individuals, agencies and corporate entities, who so willingly support this initiative by supplying the data needed for the review exercise. We would also like to extend our gratitude to those who provided suggestions or criticisms regarding the improvement of this publication.

This edition presents historical data from 2011 with specific focus on the period January to December 2015.

International Economic Developments

World economic indicators revealed a decline in global growth, expressing a slowdown of emerging markets and a similar recovery in advanced economies. Growth was projected at 3.1 percent as a whole, lower in comparison with the previous year which registered a 3.4 percent growth. Downside risks arose for emerging markets and developing commodities mainly as a result of declining commodity prices and depreciating currencies with the emerging market. (World Economic Outlook, IMF 2015)

In the United States of America growth was weaker than originally forecasted with 2.6 percent overall growth as compared to 3.1 percent projection in the second quarter. Despite a strong second quarter, the first half slowdown was due to lower capital spending in the oil sector and harsh winter weather conditions resulting in port closures. Economic activity contracted in Canada during the first half of the review period. This contraction was mainly attributed to low expenditure within the oil sector. (WEO, IMF 2015)

The European region indicated an overall 1.5 percent growth; projections were constant throughout the year, where Italy, Ireland and Spain experienced increased growth sustained by domestic demand compensating weaker growth in Germany. The United Kingdom recorded an increased growth rate of 2.5 percent compared to a 2.4 percent projection in the third quarter.

In the Central Asia region, Japan had an overall growth of 0.6 percent. The first quarter experienced a recovery followed by a drop in the third quarter to 0.8 percent growth. The first half experienced a fall in consumption as well as net exports. Investment slowed in China compared to the previous year. Additionally, imports contracted, exports declined less than imports and there was constant growth in consumption. In relation to other emerging and advanced markets within the region, Republic of China (Taiwan), The Republic of Korea as well as the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) members experienced weaker economic activity reflected by lower exports and a slowdown in domestic demand.(WEO , IMF 2015)

In the Latin American region, Brazil experienced a downturn coupled by declines in commodity prices. As a result of this downturn a weakened momentum was experienced within other countries in the region. Brazil experienced a contraction of 3.0 percent overall preceded by a contraction of 1.5 percent during the third quarter. Mexico experienced lower than expected growth with an overall 2.3 percent compared to a first quarter projection of 3.0 percent and so reflecting slower US growth and a drop in oil production. (WEO, IMF 2015)

The Russian federation showed an overall contraction in GDP with -3.8 percent .The recession experienced in Ukraine was deeper than had been forecasted previously. This recession is one of the main attributes to the conflict issues being experienced within the area. (WEO, IMF 2015)

The sub Saharan region showed a fall in economic activity affected by a reduction in oil prices as well as commodity prices. (WEO, IMF 2015)

Regional developments

The Eastern Caribbean Central Bank (ECCB) is a monetary authority for OECS members comprised of six independent states *Antigua, Grenada, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Dominica, Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent* and the overseas British territories of Anguilla and Montserrat.

The first half of 2015 experienced recovery in economic activity as compared to the same period of the previous year. This recovery was attributed to improvements mainly within construction, hotel and restaurant and agricultural sectors. Economic expansions within six territories were registered as the other two countries, Dominica and Montserrat experienced weakened economic activity. The union recorded deflation across member countries as a reduction in the price level was observed. A fiscal surplus was registered in contrast to a deficit in 2014; this surplus was attributed to an improvement in the current account position. The fiscal outturn initiated contraction in the outstanding debt stock of the public sector. In regards to merchandise trade deficit, there was a narrowing on account of the import payment decline and a higher export receipt level. The banking sector revealed expansion with regards to monetary liabilities and net foreign assets while showing a fall in domestic credit. The liquidity in commercial banking improved as a result of deposit base expansion, backed by credit decline. (ECCB, 2015)

Domestic developments

Economic activity expanded after three years of contraction. Preliminary data revealed real GDP increased by 2.4 percent compared to a 0.7 percent decline in the previous year. The construction sub-sector driven by growth within agriculture, transport and tourism contributed to the increase in activity. There was a reduction in the consumer price index of 2.6 percent on an end of year basis. Overall fiscal operations within the central government recorded a narrowing in the deficit, mainly attributed to large developments on the current account. Total disbursed outstanding public sector debt stock rose during 2015, reflecting growth in the central government's borrowings. In the banking sector, developments with regard to monetary liability growth, reductions in domestic credit and changes in external transactions to net foreign assets position were more apparent. Liquidity in commercial banks improved among tightened lending conditions. Regarding external trade, there was a smaller overall balance of payments recorded. (ECCB, 2015)

Overview of the Agriculture sector

In 2015, the Agricultural sector grew by 7.0 percent, an improvement from an 11.5 percent contraction in 2014. The banana sub sector showed a slight increase in growth from a contraction of 37.9 percent in 2014 to a contraction of 29.9 percent in 2014. The Agricultural sector showed an improvement in its contribution towards total GDP increasing from 2.8 percent in 2014 to 3.0 percent in 2015.

Bananas

The total quantity of bananas exported to the UK decreased by 5 percent to 8,324 tonnes. There was an increase in regional banana exports by 127 percent to 6737 tonnes during the period under review. Trinidad and Tobago was the major regional export market for bananas in 2015, a total of 3,830 tonnes of bananas were exported to Trinidad and Tobago.

Non-traditional crops

Purchases of non-traditional crops by supermarkets and hotels grew by 12 percent in 2015. There was an increase in the purchase all categories of crops purchased by hotels and supermarkets in 2015 compared to the corresponding period in 2014. This was attributed to greater demand for agricultural produce by hotels and supermarkets as a result of increases in stay-over arrivals and increases in domestic production of agricultural produce.

Fisheries

The total quantity of fish landed under the review period, decreased by 5 percent to 1,616 tonnes. The largest harvest areas were Vieux-fort which accounted for 31 percent of the catch, Dennery recording 20 percent of total fish landed and Gros-Islet with a total of 7 percent of fish landed. Dolphin and Tuna were the largest fish species landed, accounting for 32 percent and 22 percent respectively. Fish imports decreased by 5 percent in 2015 to 1,429 tonnes, in contrast to a 30 percent increase in imports from the previous year.

Livestock

Poultry imports decreased by 29 percent to 9,753 tonnes in 2015, partly as a result of an oversupply of local chicken on the market in 2014. Local poultry production in turn decreased by 5 percent due to uncertainty in the local market. Local egg production increased by 12 percent, which was attributed to an increase in average laying stock of farm hens as well as new entrants into the market. Beef and pork accounted for 32 percent and 51 percent respectively of total meat imports in 2015. The increase in imports of the two meats in 2015 can be tied to the gain in market access by US beef suppliers and increases in demand for these products as a result of increased visibility and supply in southern retail outlets.

Banana Industry



Banana exports to the UK declined by 5 percent to 8,324 tonnes in 2015. The decline in the number of bananas exported to the UK can be tied to increases in quality standards required for bananas exported as well as the shift by farmers from banana production to non-traditional crops. As a result, revenue earnings from banana export declined by 6 percent to EC\$15 million in 2015. All four quarters showed a decrease in tonnage exported with the exception of the first quarter which showed an increase in exports. The first half of 2015 showed a 4 percent decline in exports from 5,129 tonnes in 2014 to 4,938 tonnes.

The decline in exports was more pronounced during the second half of 2015. Banana exports to the UK market declined by 7 percent during the second half of 2015. The Saint Lucia National Fair Trade Organization (SLNFTO) exported the majority of bananas to the UK accounting for 92 percent (7,708 tonnes) of total exports. The Tropical Quality Fruit Company (TQFC) accounted for 7 percent of total exports at 612 tonnes. The Farmers Support Company accounted for the remaining 1 percent of total bananas exported at 5 tonnes.

Notwithstanding a decline in banana exports to the UK, regional exports of bananas grew by 127 percent, from 2,974 tonnes in 2014 to 6,737 tonnes in 2015. Bananas exported to Trinidad increased by 763 percent from 444 tonnes in 2014 to 3,830 tonnes in 2015. Exports to Barbados decreased slightly by 1.6 percent from 2530 tonnes in 2014 to 2489 tonnes in 2015. Antigua reentered the trade market in 2015 with exports increasing from 1 tonne in 2013 to 417 tonnes in 2015. Trinidad accounted for 57 percent of regional banana exports followed by Barbados with 37 percent and Antigua with the remaining 6 percent.

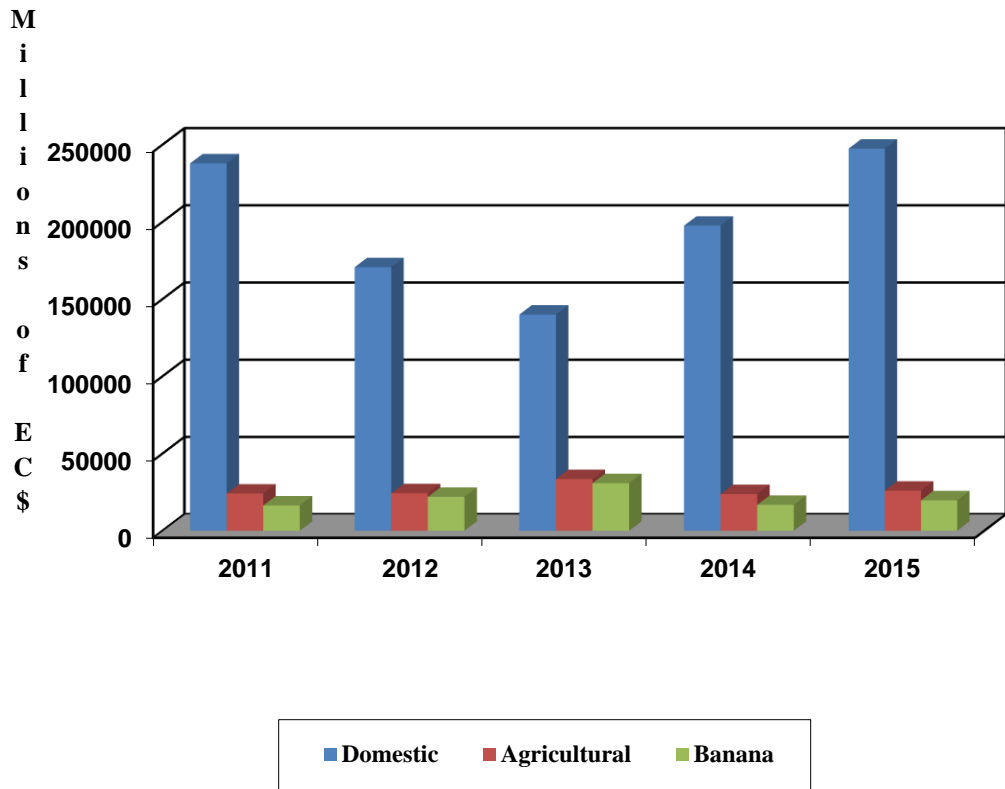
Total domestic exports rose by 25 percent from 198 million in 2014 to 247 million in 2015. This increase in total domestic exports was attributed to increased export demand in 2015. Total agricultural exports which accounted for 12 percent of total domestic exports increased by 9 percent from 24 million in 2014 to 26 million in 2015. The increase in agricultural exports was attributed to the increase in regional banana exports during the period under review. Total banana exports which accounted for 76 percent of total agricultural exports, increased by 18 percent from 17 million in 2014 to 20 million in 2015.

Domestic, Agricultural & Banana Exports 2011 - 2015



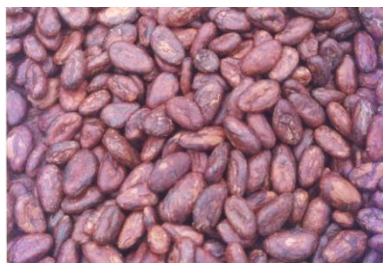

The Cocoa Industry



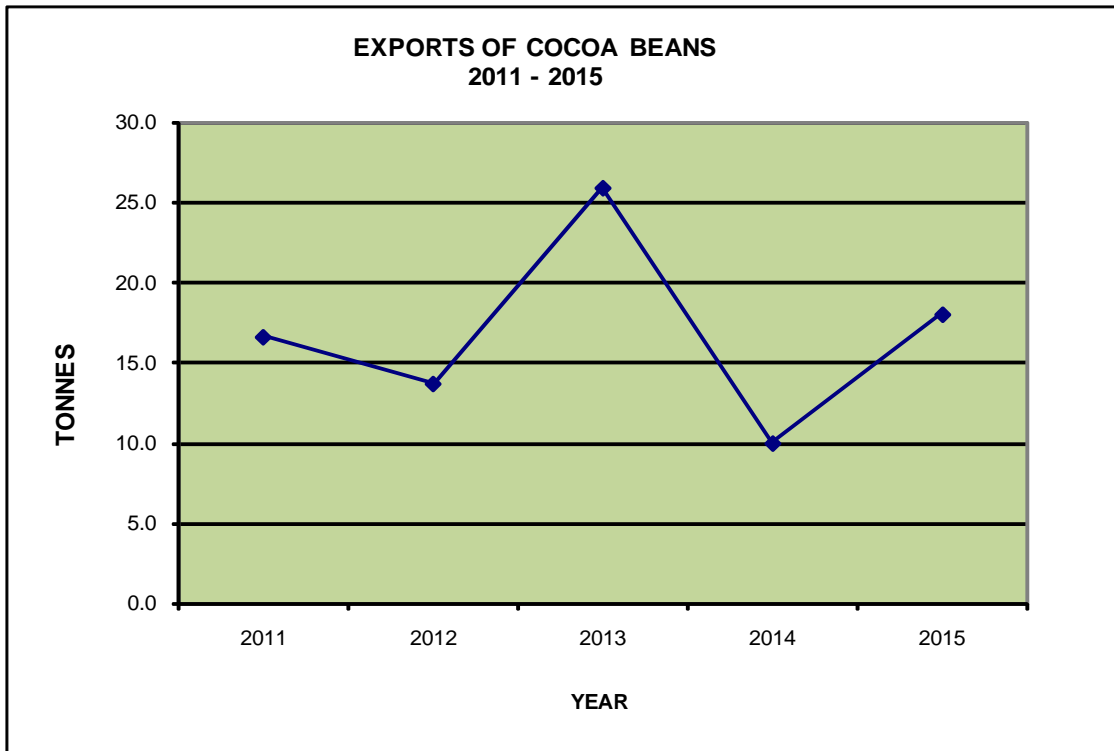
Cocoa production increased by 68 percent from 19 tonnes in 2014 to 32 tonnes in 2015. The quantity exported increased by 80 percent from 10 tonnes in 2014 to 18 tonnes in 2015. The value of exports tripled from 157 thousand in 2014 to 486 thousand in 2015. These significant increases in production and export may be attributed to policies and business growth by key players in the industry. Hotel Chocolat began its cocoa plantation operations in Saint Lucia since 2011 and has been consistent in developing and strengthening ethical and fair trade policies as well as increasing its demand for cocoa beans through the establishment of retail outlets.

Non –Traditional crops



The quantity of local agricultural produce purchased by marketing outlets increased by 12 percent from a total of 3,428 tonnes in 2014 to 3,829 tonnes in 2015. Marketing outlets purchase of Musa species increased by 11 percent from 1,610 tonnes in 2014 to 1,794 tonnes in 2015. Purchases of fruit and tree crops increased by 21 percent from 569 tonnes in 2014 to 690 tonnes in 2015 while vegetables and root crop purchases increased by 6 percent and 4 percent respectively in 2015.

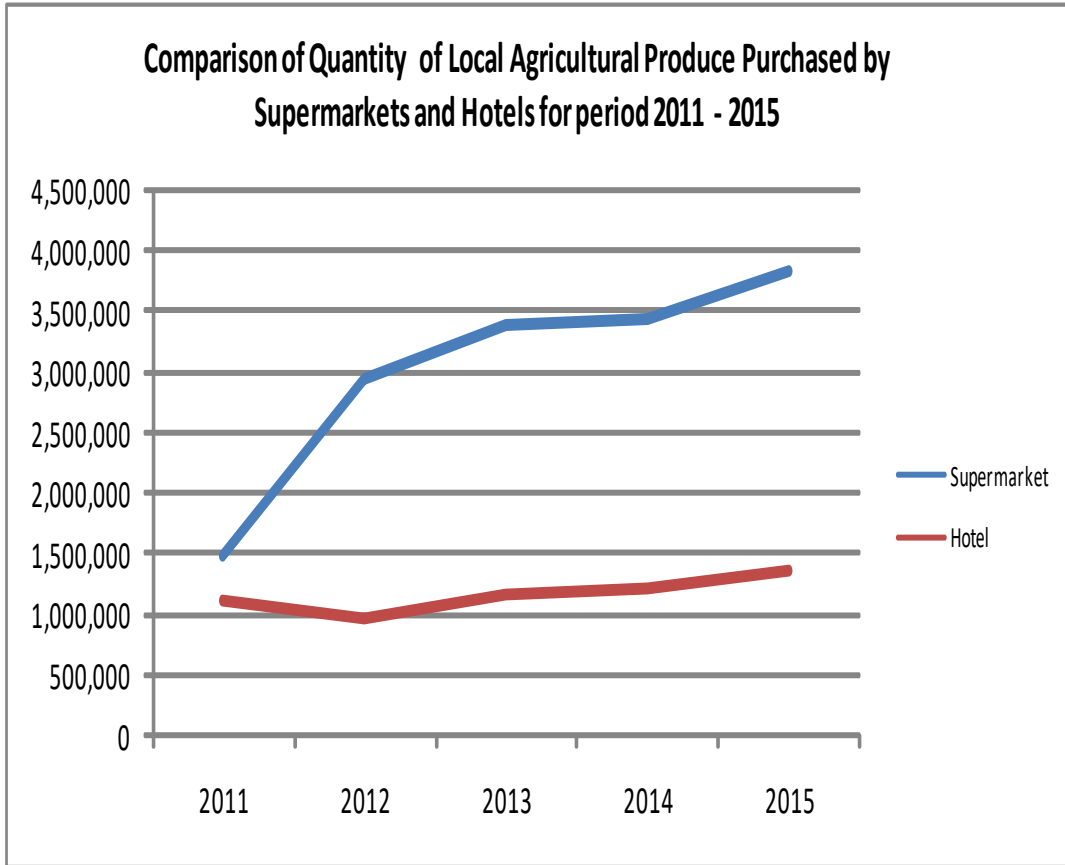
The total quantity of local agricultural produce purchased by hotels during the period under review increased by 12 percent from 1,230 tonnes in 2014 to 1,375 tonnes in 2015. The increase in purchase may be attributed to the increase in arrivals under the review period, where the number of stay over and cruise ship passengers exceeded one million. Fruit and tree crops were the highest in quantity purchased with a 19 percent increase from 414 tonnes in 2014 to 494 tonnes in 2015.

Fisheries sector



The fisheries sector recorded a decline of 5 percent in the quantity of fish landed from 1,695 tonnes in 2014 to 1,616 tonnes in 2015. Accordingly, the total value of fish landed declined by 4 percent from 26 million in 2014 to 25 million in 2015. Vieux Fort, Dennery and Gros-Islet posted the largest increase in fish landings. These districts harvest a significantly large amount of fish since they harbor the largest number of fishers and fishing vessels. In terms of fish landings by species, dolphin accounted for 31 percent of total landings at 505 tonnes. Tuna accounted for 23 percent of total fish landed at 374 tonnes. King fish accounted for 5 percent of the total quantity landed at a total of 87 tonnes. Flying fish known to show much variability declined drastically with no fish being harvested in 2015.

The total quantity of fish imported decreased by 5 percent from 1,500 tonnes in 2014 to 1,429 tonnes in 2015. The total value of imported fish decreased by 10 percent from EC\$21 million in 2014 to EC\$19 million in 2015. Canned fish imports accounted for 57 percent of total imports, frozen and chilled fish imports accounted for 15 percent of total imports, other types of fish imports accounted for the remaining 28 percent of total fish imports.

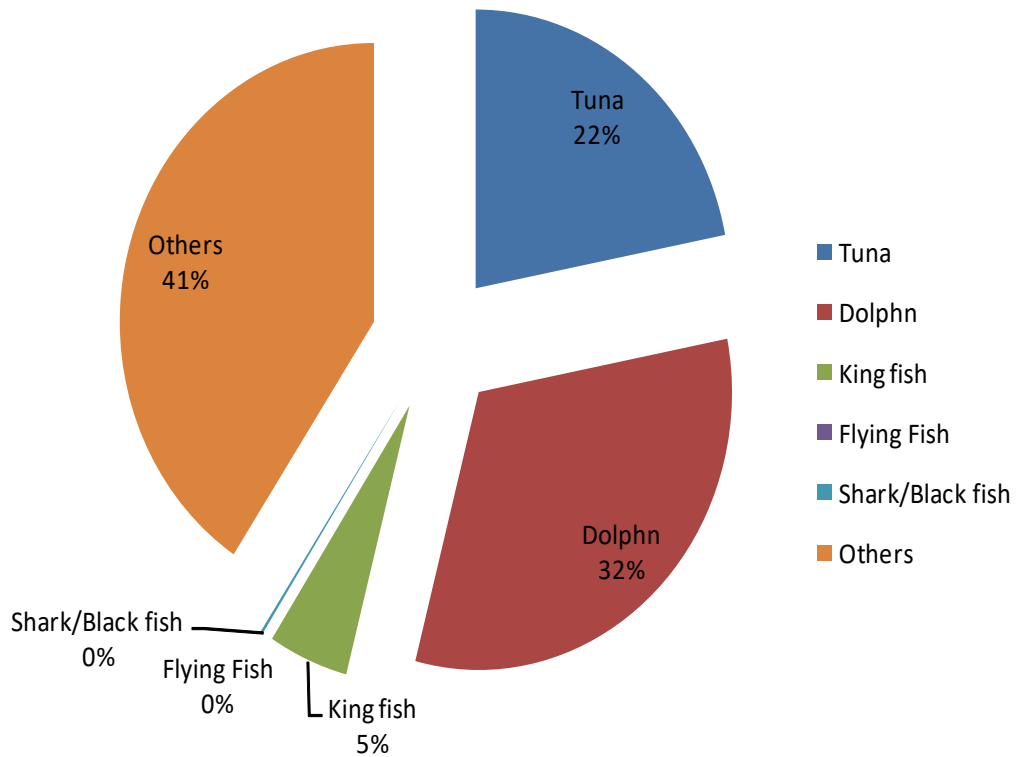

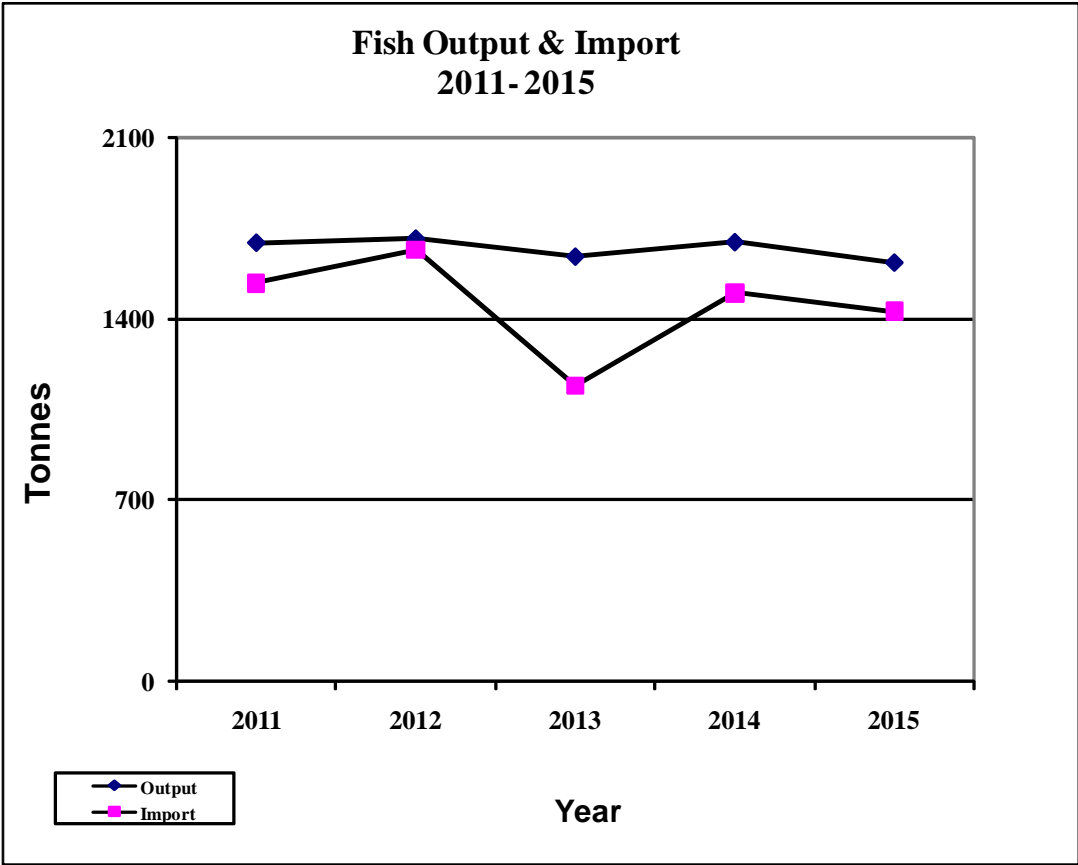

Livestock Sector

Poultry imports

Total poultry imports declined by 29 percent from 13,712 tonnes in 2014 to 9,753 tonnes in 2015. Imports of chicken declined by 33 percent in 2015 to 8,650 tonnes and accounted for 89 percent of total poultry imports. The value of poultry imports decreased by 38 percent from 58 million in 2014 to 36 million in 2015. Whole poultry imports increased by 26 percent from 61 tonnes in 2014 to 77 tonnes in 2015. The importation of poultry necks backs and wings decreased by 47 percent from 9,072 tonnes in 2014 to 4,848 tonnes in 2015. Poultry other parts increased by 5 percent from 4,580 tonnes in 2014 to 4,829 tonnes in 2015.

Egg Production



Local production of eggs increased by 12 percent from 1.3 million dozen eggs in 2014 to 1.5 million dozen eggs in 2015. This was attributed to the 7 percent increase in the average laying stock of farm hens from 70 thousand hens in 2014 to 75 thousand hens in 2015. The total revenue derived from local egg production remained constant in 2015 at 7.9 million when compared to the corresponding period in 2014. Saint Lucia continued to be self sufficient in egg production which resulted in zero eggs imports under the review period.

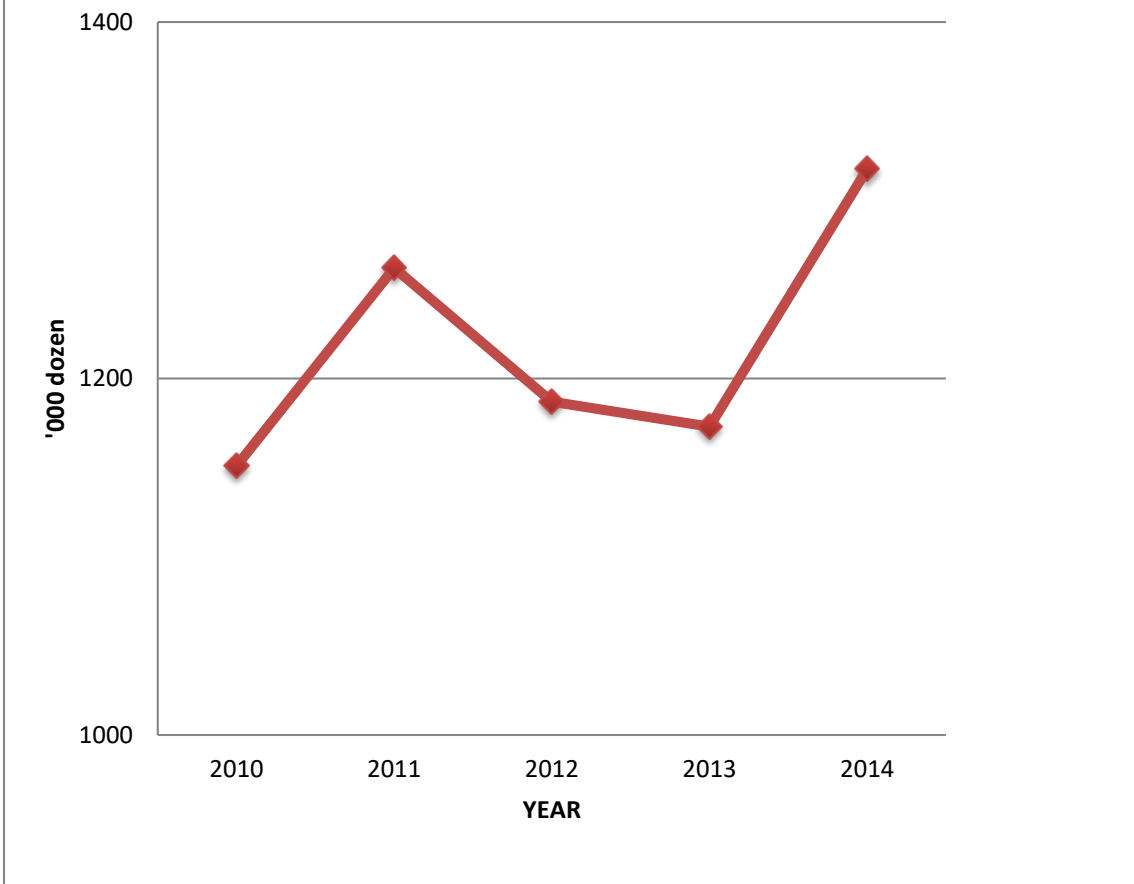

Local poultry production decreased by 5 percent from 1,925 tonnes in 2014 to 1,824 tonnes in 2015. The value of local poultry (chicken) production decreased by 4 percent from 23 million in 2014 to 22 million in 2015. The production of whole chicken declined by 8 percent from 732 tonnes in 2014 to 677 tonnes in 2015 while the production of mixed parts decreased by 4 percent from a total of 1,193 tonnes in 2014 to 1,147 tonnes in 2015.

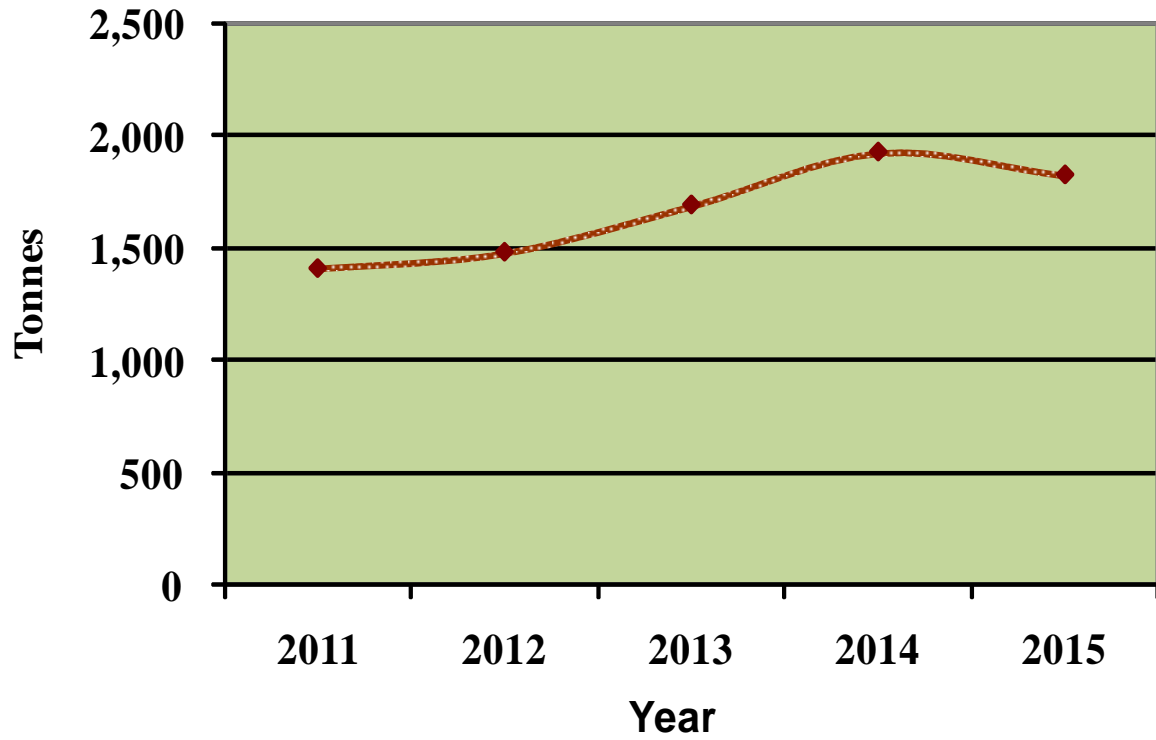

Local pork industry



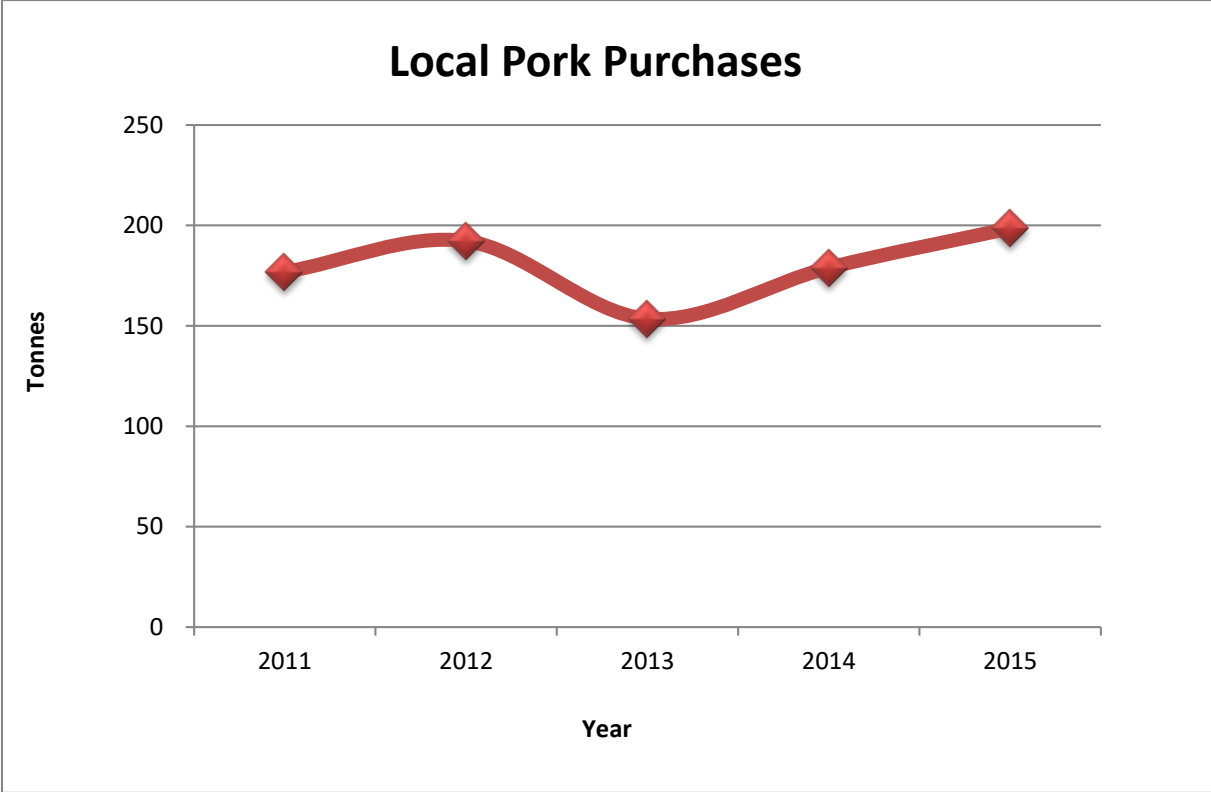
Pork imports accounted for 52 percent of total meat imports in 2015. Local pork purchases rose by 11 percent to 199 tonnes in 2015. Revenue increased by 11 percent to EC\$2.6 million in during the period under review. This increase was associated with a reduction in feed prices in recent years as well as the increase in demand due to improvements in visibility and availability in local retail outlets.

Following a 23 percent decline in 2014, imports of beef increased by 61 percent to 805 tonnes, valued at EC\$13.7 million in 2015 indicating burgeoning demand, particularly by the hotel sector. Similarly, increasing demand by both households and the hotel sector resulted in a 77 percent increase in the importation of pork to 1,309 tonnes, valued at EC\$7.4 million during the period under review. The quantity of mutton and chevron imported which has been lower than that of beef and pork over the past five years, increased by 9 percent and 16 percent respectively with a total value of EC\$4.2 million in 2015.

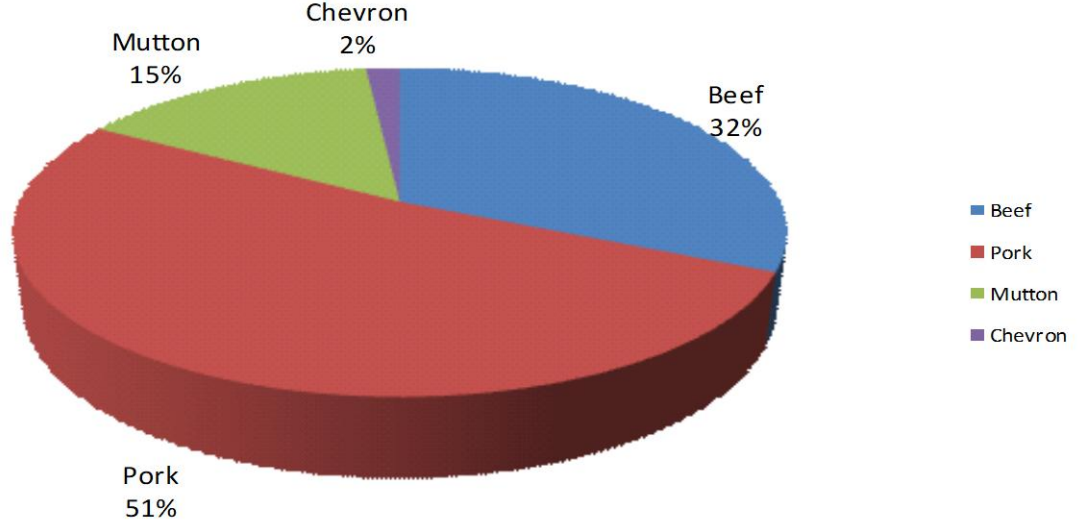

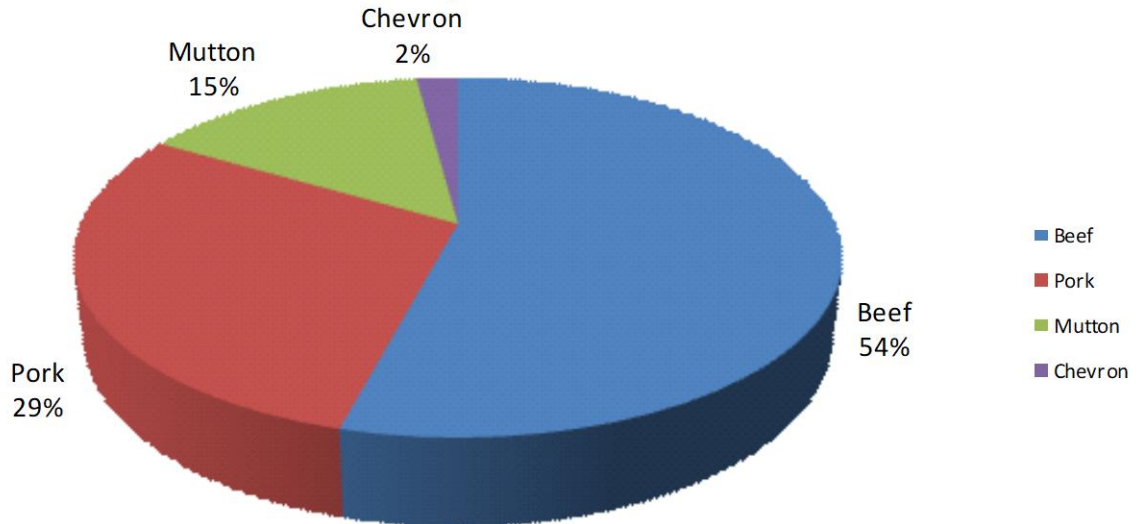
Meat Imports - 2015

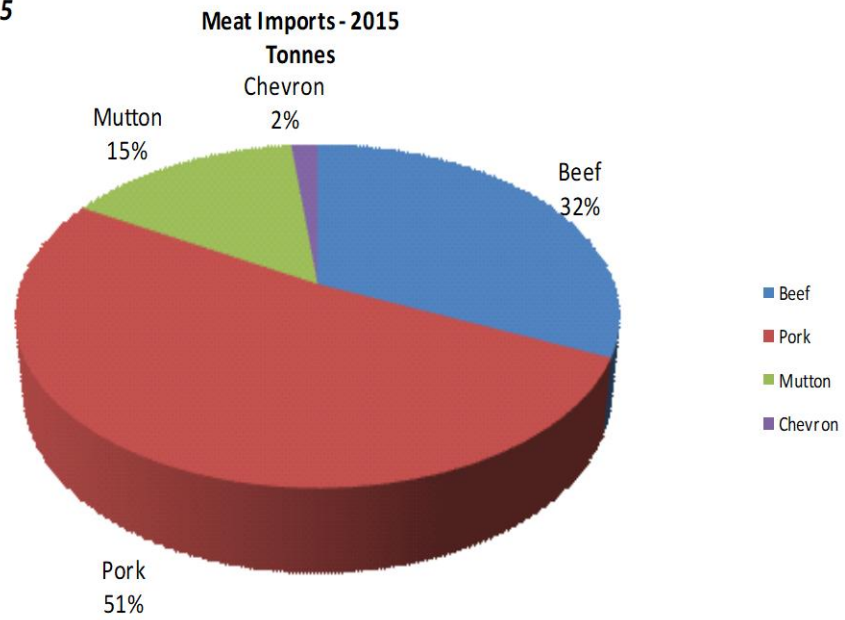
Imports of cheese and butter/butterfat grew by 4 percent and 84 percent respectively in 2015, valued at EC\$12.8 million and EC\$2.8 million respectively. However, milk products showed a decrease in imports by 3 percent to 3,837 tonnes valued at EC\$21.7 million. Milk represented 75 percent of total livestock products imported in 2015, followed by cheese, occupying 20 percent and butter/butterfat the remaining 5 percent.

Agricultural Financing

For the past four consecutive years, loans for agricultural activities have exhibited a downward trend. This may be attributed to the unwillingness of financial institutions to grant loans for agricultural purposes due to the risks associated with agricultural activities, particularly with regards to climate change, pest and diseases.

A total of 19 loans valued at EC\$432,000 was disbursed in 2015, a reduction in comparison with 25 loans valued at EC\$780,000 which was disbursed during the previous year. Loans for livestock activities decreased from 7 loans valued at EC\$263,000 in 2014 to 4 loans valued at EC\$109,000 in 2015. The number of loans for fishing activities remained constant in 2015. Three loans valued at EC\$84 thousand was disbursed in 2015 compared to 3 loans valued at EC\$120,000 in 2014. Loans for crop development activities grew by 38 percent to 11 in 2015 valued at EC\$231,000. Loans issued for land purchase and development decreased from 7 in 2014 to 1 loan being given in 2015. Accordingly, the value of loans for land purchase and development declined from EC\$265,000 in 2014 to EC\$8,000 in 2015.

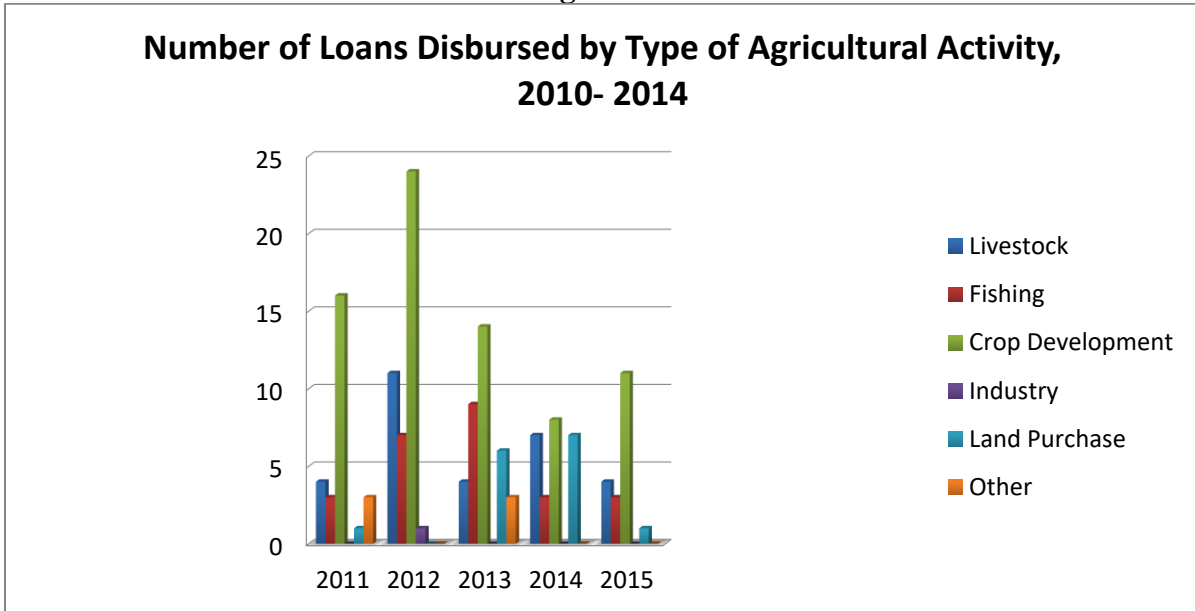
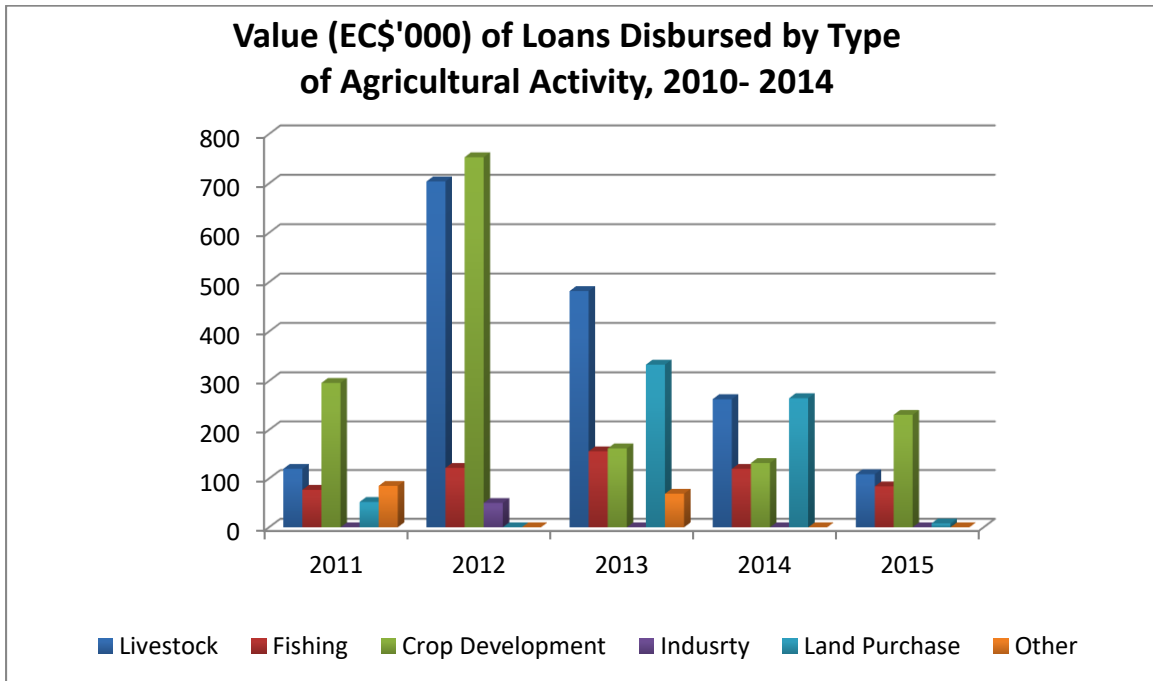

Food trade balance

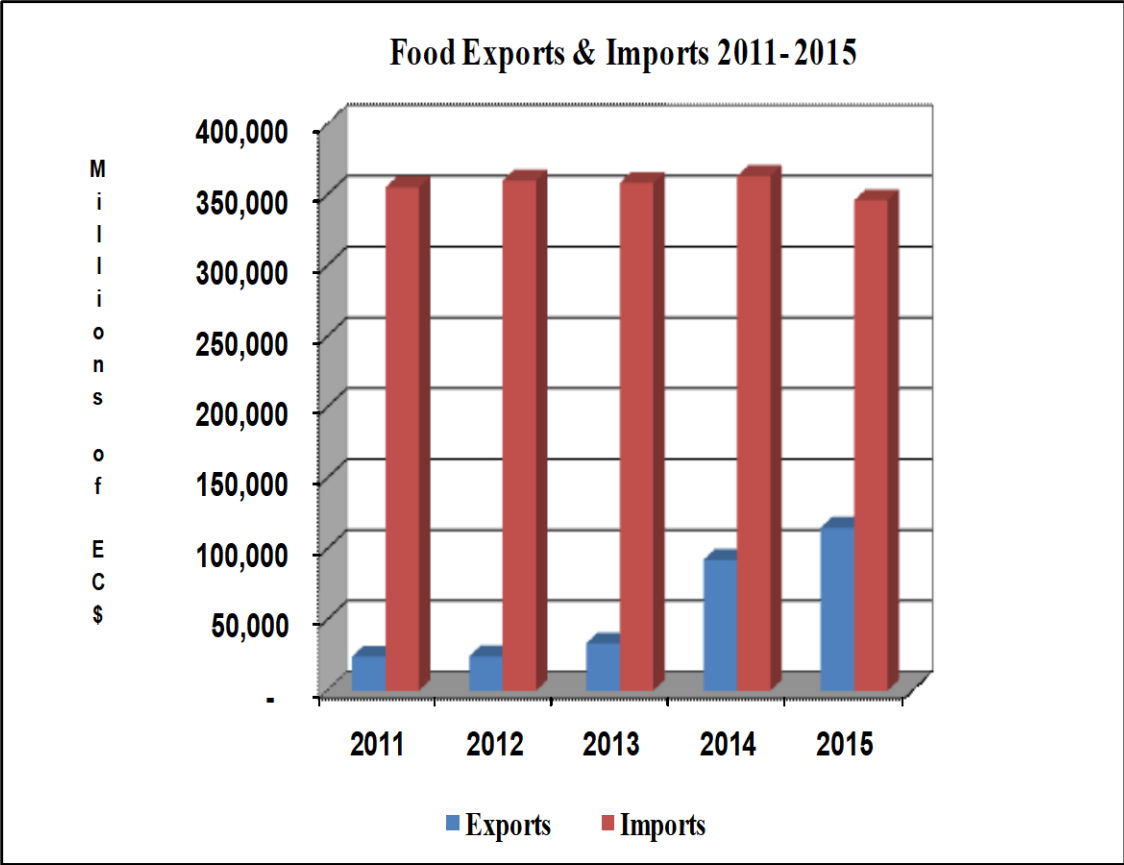
The trade deficit on food declined by 8.1 percent from EC\$340 million in 2014 to EC\$312 million in 2015. An increase in food exports coupled with a decline in food imports resulted in the narrowing of the food trade deficit during the period under review. Total imports decreased by 11 percent to EC\$1.5 billion in 2015, while domestic exports rose by 25.3 percent to EC\$247 million.

Total food exports increased by 44.3 percent to EC\$34 million in 2015. Accordingly, food exports as a percentage of domestic exports rose from 12 percent in 2014 to 14 percent in 2015. Notwithstanding a decline in food imports by 4.7 percent to EC\$346 million in 2015, food imports as a percentage of total imports rose from 21 percent in 2014 to 22 percent in 2015.

Composition of Food Imports

Imports of food declined by 5 percent to EC\$346 million in 2015. Meat and meat preparations, cereal and cereal preparations, vegetables and fruits and dairy products and eggs were the four major categories of food items imported in 2015 and accounted for 59 percent of total food imports. All four major categories of food items imported registered declines in the value of imports in 2015. This resulted in a reduction in the food import bill and a narrowing of the food trade deficit in 2015. Cereal and cereal preparations recorded the largest decline in 2015. Cereal and cereal preparations declined by 42 percent to EC\$43 million, followed by meat and meat preparations which decreased by 22 percent to EC\$62 million and dairy products and eggs which fell by 9 percent to EC\$42 million in 2015. Vegetables and fruits recorded the least decline in imports, declining by 0.1 percent to EC\$57 million. This signals the need for an increase in the domestic production of vegetables and fruits which are primarily imported.

Exports of selected agricultural produce

Exports of selected agricultural produce more than doubled in 2015. Total exports of selected agricultural produce rose by 118 percent to 7,785 tonnes valued at EC\$10.2 million in 2015 when compared with the corresponding period in 2014. This was attributed to a significant increase in regional banana exports, particularly to Trinidad. Exports of bananas to the regional market grew from 2,684 tonnes valued at EC\$2.0 million in 2014 to 6,749 tonnes valued at EC\$7.4 million in 2015.

Plantain, breadfruit, mango and avocado were the other major agricultural produce exported in 2015. Together they accounted for 13 percent of total agricultural produce exported in 2015 while bananas accounted for the remaining 87 percent of total agricultural produce exported in 2015. Plantain and avocados registered declines in export tonnage in 2015 while exports of breadfruit and mangoes increased. Exports of breadfruit rose by 55 percent to 384 tonnes, valued at EC\$2 million in 2015 and exports of mangoes rose from 68 tonnes in 2014 to 148 tonnes in 2015, valued at EC\$290 thousand dollars. Exports of plantain declined by 9.1 percent to 482 tonnes, valued at EC\$524 thousand dollars in 2015 while avocado exports fell from 25 tonnes in 2014 to 16 tonnes in 2015, valued at EC\$44 thousand.
